Ukraine—A ministry for children, The House of James, is celebrating its second anniversary. The ministry is set up as family-type homes, up to 10 kids per home. The children have a “mom,” a “dad,” and “siblings,” says Director Sean Johnson. The ministry was founded by Johnson following a mission trip to Ukraine and Russia in 2003. Guatemala—In September, Pastor Russell Long of the Bel Air (Maryland) Church and a team from his church attended the dedication of two sanctuaries for Maya Indian congregations funded by his church under mission partnerships. One church was packed with more than 400 people who had walked for miles for the service. Upon an invitation from visitors, Pastor Alfonso Chun Choc drove an hour and walked two hours to plant that mission, a direct outgrowth of the Bel Air investment in funding and going. New Children's Program Launched

Papua New Guinea—A new World Mission Broadcast radio program for children went on the air in September. KILOP (“*Krais I Laikim Olgeta Pikinini*”; translation—“Christ Loves All Kids”) aired on six stations in its first month.



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Christ's love is expressed practically in a 10-minute program of stories, music, interviews, and biblical application. Melanesian Nazarenes, including 100 children's ministry teachers, attended workshops and wrote scripts for the program. NMI Missions Book Reintroduced

A Profile in Joy, originally published as an NMI missions book in 1993, has been translated into Korean. The book features the story of Kim Sung Gap (Stephen Kim), a Korean-sponsored missionary and pastor in the Philippines who wanted to be a faculty member at Asia-Pacific Nazarene Theological Seminary (APNTS). But his life ended before his plan could be realized. His wife, Ihm Hyang Sook (Grace), stayed in Manila with their son, continued to minister, and was eventually ordained by the Korea District. She pastors the Philippine Korea Church of the Nazarene on the APNTS campus. Korea Nazarene Publishing House (KNPH) produced and distributed 2,000 copies of *A Profile in Joy*.

Serbian Orphans Need Hope

Serbia—Thousands of children live in group care such as orphanages, dormitories, and foster care. Many have disabilities or are illiterate. Because fewer than 0.2 percent of Serbia's 10 million people are evangelical Christian, these isolated children have little hope of hearing about Jesus Christ's love for them.

Eritrean Students Punished

Eritrea—Eight Christian high school students recently were locked in a metal shipping container in extremely hot temperatures. The punishment was the result of the students' objection to the seizure and burning of 1,500 Bibles belonging to

new students. This torture is a commonly used against Christians arrested for their religious beliefs. Almost 2,000 believers are thought to be under arrest in the country, including nearly 30 clergymen. *Compass Direct News*

Bibles for Children

Vietnam—60,000 copies of *The Illustrated Children's Bible* (New Testament) in Vietnamese have been received since 2006, and 60,000 requested. Churches originally received 1-2 copies each, requiring quite a few children to share a copy. In Vietnam, there are 10 million children under the age of 6 (12 percent of the population). The book was originally written in Vietnamese through the Children's Bible Translation committee, not translated from another language. *Open Doors USA*

Blessings for Albino Children

Uganda—People here believe that an albino child is a family curse. The inherited condition causes lack of pigmentation and eyes damaged by the sun. Communities often shun albinos, and ritual killings of persons with albinism are rising. Every Child Ministry (ECM) is collecting sunglasses to reach out to these kids. The project's goal is to deliver sunglasses and to show the Christ's love to children and their families. *Mission Network News*

Crackdown on Christianity in Laos

Laos—Several Christian families refuse to renounce their faith in Jesus Christ despite government pressure. Church buildings have been demolished, and Christians have been harassed for not meeting in a proper worship structure. In another village, a chief fines believers for holding a church service. A general crackdown on Christianity is occurring across Laos. *Compass Direct News*

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
